Global Studies Option

With growing U.S. involvement in international markets and the increasingly global character of American society, understanding the interconnections between cultures becomes all the more crucial for success within the University and the world beyond. The critical thinking skills imparted by a degree option in Global Studies provide students with key tools for understanding places in the world within a broader context.

Global studies students learn about the language, history, culture and politics of a particular international area. The global studies option encourages students to expand their international awareness by providing national and global exposure to their career field. The global studies major also pairs well as a second major to other areas of study.

Becoming Career Ready...

/ Qualified faculty work closely and interact with students in a small class environment.

/ Global Cultures & Languages: Global Studies graduates work in corporations, all levels of government, import/export industries, businesses, travel and tourism industries, teaching and non-profit associations. Examples of job titles include cultural diversity officer, embassy assistant, civil service employee, lobbyist, immigration officer, cultural resource manager and consumer researcher.

/ Majors gain knowledge from a broad interdisciplinary approach.

/ Graduates are exceptionally prepared for advanced graduate studies in other disciplines.

/ Students in the program may choose life-changing study-abroad in semester exchange programs in countries such as Japan, France, Germany, Spain, Ecuador, and Taiwan. Short-term exchange programs are possible in Ecuador, Germany and Taiwan. The cost of these programs is similar to the educational costs at Southeast.

/ 100% of Southeast programs offer a real-world experience through internship, study-abroad program, clinical opportunity, student teaching, or research internship opportunities. The majority of global studies graduates find employment within a year of graduation, or attend graduate school in programs for ESL, international business, geography, political science, law, etc.

/ The path to a successful career starts with you! You can maximize your career development by working closely with Career Services and Southeast faculty – they are here to help you connect your passions, interests and skills to jobs and opportunities in the field. Career Services provides professional career counseling and coaching, resume critiques, practice interviews, job search strategies, career events, networking opportunities and more.
